More than 200 people attended the Dunedin RSA Centennial Church Service at First Church. RSA representatives travelled from throughout the region to attend the service.



Presidents Report

The centennial year has been busy throughout the district with a number of local commemorations taking place.

As part of WW1 100 activities many towns have remembered the men and women who



This year the focus was on the Battle of the Somme where the Otago Regt suffered enormous casualties at the start of the ill-fated campaign. Memorial crosses were placed at Queens Gardens as a tribute to those men.

The ANZAC Day Dawn Service was well attended. The guest speaker, Commodore John Campbell paid a special tribute the seated veterans.



I attended the laying up of the 2 NZ Scots Colours at Toitu Settlers Museum. It is appropriate that the Colours remain in Otago bearing in mind the rich history of the unit.

The RSA's Centennial Church Service was well attended. A special thanks to Neville Selwood and Jim Clegg who carried in the NZ and RSA flags. We were privileged to have Wing Commander Ant Hawes, Principal Defence Force Chaplain as the preacher.

The RSA National Council was held in Wellington in October. The remits went through smoothly with most being focused on tidying up the roles and responsibilities of the Presidents Forum and the Board to bring them into line with new legislation and recommendations from the Independent Taskforce.

Other keynote topics were:

- The repatriation of service personnel buried in cemeteries in Singapore and Malaya. The Government is looking at this and a report is due in early 2017. The Australian Government has returned all its personnel.
- A group of contemporary veterans forming a trust called "No Duff" to deal with veterans who are presenting with a number of physical and psychological issues.
- Issues around medallic recognition of service in Singapore.
- The appointment of Rear Admiral(Rtd) Jack Steer as the new CEO of RNZRSA

I took the opportunity to visit the exhibitions at Te Papa and the old war memorial building. I recommend you to visit these venues; they are outstanding and have won international acclaim.

I attended the book launch of the history of the RSA by Stephen Clarke who attended Kings High School and Otago University.

This year we took the opportunity for youth to play a part in the Armistice Day Service.

Lola Garden from St Hilda's Collegiate gave brilliant speech. She was supported by the school choir. A certificate of appreciation was presented to her and the choir.

The Rev Dr Tony Martin blessed the new flagpoles which were erected at Queens gardens as a commemorative project.

We say farewell to Fred Daniel on his retirement as CEO of Montecillo. His contribution while in his role as CEO has been of tremendous benefit to the Dunedin RSA.

As part of our Centennial celebrations we have presented a number of awards and certificates to individuals and organisations that have helped our organisation.

The WW100 governance group met on the 7th December to discuss commemorative activities in 2017 & 2018. In 2017 the Fields of remembrance crosses will reflect the Otago regiment fatalities from the Battles of Passchendaele and Messines.

If you had a relative who had a cross in Dunedin Fields of remembrance during 2014, 2015, or 2016 you can apply to Marilyn Anderson at the DCC if you wish have the cross. (Proof of family connection will be needed.)

If you are planning any commemorative events for WW1 in your area, please let us know.

RETURNED AND SERVICES

What we now know as Cromwell and District Returned and Services
Association was formed 100 years ago. In 1916 it was a sub-branch
of Dunedin Returned Soldiers Association. A letter of 19th November
1919 records that we had members in Cromwell, Bannockburn, Lowburn,
Queensbury, Luggate, Mt Barker, Albert Town, Pembroke (Wanaka),
Maungaweara, Hawea Flat, Tarras, Malver Downs, Lindis Crossing, and
Bendigo. We called ourselves "Upper Clutha RSA sub Association.

Only our name has changed. Our objectives remain constant – to provide welfare for our veterans and to act as guardians of the remembering of those who gave their lives in the service of our country. In this latter role, we held the following two events:

- On Friday 11 November, we marked the signing of the Armistice, that resulted in hostilities ceasing in World War 1 at the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month 1918. A short service was held at the Cenotaph beside the Memorial Hall in Melmore Terrace.
- On Sunday 13 November, RSA members were invited to join in the 9am Remembrance Day service St Andrews Anglican Church, on the corner of Blyth & Donegal Streets.

Members of the Cromwell community joined in on both occasions.

Another year draws to a close and I would like to take the opportunity to thank all of those people who have helped us out this year. Volunteer visitors have made a positive difference to the wellbeing of those in rest homes and hospitals, volunteer collectors have given time and effort to make another successful Poppy Day — which enables our trust to deliver services and assistance to our ex-service family, other volunteers have helped by offering wise counsel, sound governance and advice. Many people give their time to address the specific needs of our ex-service family in Branch areas as well as the city, to assemble posies, deliver things, organise events, sort and clean stuff and generally maintain our operation. Professional people and businesses have helped too by supporting our cause, and our funders who have helped with their grants and donations. And of course, the public offer their support by donating generously on Poppy Day. We would not be able to deliver a quality professional service without the support we enjoy.

As you settle back to reflect on the passing of another year, please take some time to consider that New Zealand is 'making' veterans at a faster rate now than at any time since WW2 so we need your support more than ever. Conventional warfare has changed and our service people and police deploy on a variety of peace keeping and humanitarian missions around the globe and are being exposed to all sorts of trauma, toxins, stresses and environmental extremes. Much like our allies we are seeing veterans returning with psychological as well as physical injuries. Psychological injuries are harder to spot, but just as damaging and we must remember that 100 years ago, back in 1916, RSA was started to support the needs and wellbeing of returning soldiers.

Earlier this month I made a commitment to RNZRSA: 'To attend any incident involving an ex-service person, at short notice, at any time of the day or night, in the general areas of the Dunedin RSA and it's branches, to offer whatever immediate support I can while waiting for appropriate agencies to engage and, where appropriate, making those referrals myself.'

This is a reflection on the very real needs of the time and effectively becomes our 'emergency response capability'. It also reinforces the good work of our network of Branch Welfare Officers, and is a resource available, after consultation, to the wider district.

I would like to ask you all to spare a little time over the festive season to think of any of our ex-service family who may be struggling financially, physically or emotionally. Support can range from just a few kind words and compassionate listening, to referral to specialist agencies. Your RSA Welfare Officers can be a great first point of contact, and I am always available to offer support as well.



Each cross bears the name, service number and rank of a soldier killed during the campaign.


